Fort Sutter Meeting Minutes February 15, 2025

Call to Order: The February 15, 2025 meeting was called to order at: 1:03 pm by Tracy Stahlman, the new Fort Sutter President.

[Prior to the official beginning of the meeting, John Markley presented Rich Ostrander with his "Well Done" coin from the AMCA. Also present were honorary members Dave Kafton, Rich Hardmeyer, and Jim Moore.]

- Welcome New Members: Mike Moore; Guests: None; at the meeting
- **Membership**: Karie Schenken, Charmain reports there are: 73 Primary members, 27 Associates, 2 Junior members, and 6 Honorary members.
- **Treasury Report**: The treasurer was not present. Tracy Stahlman gave a brief summary of cash assets which total over \$31,000.
- **Minutes**: A motion was made by John Markley and seconded by Joe Giammona to approve the minutes as written for the December 7, 2024 meeting.

Old Business

- **NORCAL Cycle Swap:** The NORCAL Cycle Swap was on February 2, 2025. The next swap will be April 13, 2025. This is often an opportunity to recruit new chapter members. Contact Bob Henry or Tracy Stahlman if you can help.
- Event at Iron Steed HD: Mike Moore (son of long time member Jim Moore and a new member of the Ft. Sutter chapter) represents Harley Davidson in Northern California and Nevada. He described the Iron Steed event as an opportunity to unite people from different aspects of motorcycling. Representatives were present from several national motorcycling organizations including AMA, BMWMOA, Blue Knights, Green Knights, and others. Also present were reps who provide training in both off-road and on-road riding disciplines. Primary speaker at the event was Sean Reilly with Rider 2.0 who provides a track day based skills improvement course. Tracy said that Rider 2.0 might provide a discount if a large enough group from Ft. Sutter signed up. John Markley thanked Mike for spreading the AMCA word.

New Business

Dixon planning:

- o Sign up sheet was circulated for volunteers to take on specific tasks.
- We are currently committed to the 2025 Dixon events.
- Need a commitment from someone to haul the club trailer to and from the event.
- o After discussion, it was decided to keep the banquet in Denverton Hall. The meal will be a simplified meal with spaghetti, garlic bread, and caesar salad and cookies for dessert. This allows us to reduce the charge to \$15 which may attract more people to the banquet. (Passed by show of hands of members present with no opposition.)
- Mark Milton will once again take the lead on the Thursday Dixon bbq.
- Tracy has decided to purchase a few less event pins this year. Instead of having pins in the vendor packets, their packets will include a coupon good for a pin at the merch booth. This will give us a count of who really wants pins and may increase traffic at the merch booth.
- Kim asked whether there was a need for red club shirts as supply is limited. No strong interest from members in attendance for more shirts, so no order for shirts will be placed as of now.
- **National Road Run 2026:** We will commit to 2026 National Road Run with Tunie volunteering to take the lead. Tracy suggested gold country rather than Tahoe this time.

Dr Sprocket's Column BOOZEFIGHTERS



when I spied a "like new" 1957 FLH in original paint parked with its rider sitting on a rock looking like the man in the Marlboro commercials. Leather bomber jacket, pilot shades, smoking a cigarette.

That was my introduction to Dale Walksler of the Wheels Through Time Museum in Maggie Valley, North Carolina. We've been good friends ever since but the best part was yet to come.

I met up with a bunch of old friends later that same day when I finally reached Furnace Creek. They were participating in the annual Death Valley antique motorcycle run. It just so happened that Dale was there for the run too. He had a truck down in Redondo Beach picking up a bike for his museum and he'd be heading back east the next day. I ask him who had the bike and he said it was a guy named "Rotten Richard". You could have knocked me over, it's a small world indeed. The same Richard I served with in the Air Force and who sold me my first chopper.

The next day my bike split a seam in its factory Sportster tank and I was stuck big time. Up steps an old friend, 'J.D.' Cameron, and says "I'm leaving early in the morning for L.A. Load that thing into the back of my pickup and I'll drop you at the H-D dealer

in Palmdale and you can get another tank there."

At 4am he bangs on my door and tells me to get out of bed as he's leaving PDQ. He then goes and climbs in the passenger seat and states, "You're driving, I'm sleeping. Take the back road through the desert to Barstow. Keep it under 1,800 rpm."

I find myself at the wheel of his hotrod Dodge pickup that he had just run at Bonneville for the Mopar factory. It had a tweaked Cummins diesel that at 1,800 rpm was cruising at 80 mph down a dirt road through the desert in pitch black with its KC lights ablaze.


We were at the H-D dealership at 9am sharp when they opened the doors. I unloaded my bike, said adios to John and an hour later with a new tank afixed to my top bar I was headed to L.A.

How would I have known then that a few years later J.D. Cameron's grandson Craig and I would meet one afternoon in a Virginia City, Nevada saloon while I was on another ride and become great friends. And we've put more than a few miles under our seats together since then.

just taking a ride and things happen – just out of the blue – that have an impact for years to come. In 1991 I had left Sacramento for a ride to SoCal via Hwy 120 over the Sierras through Yosemite and down Hwy 395 with a stop over at my mother-in-law's place in Bishop.

The next day I'm just about to drop into the Panamint Valley – just one mountain pass from Death Valley –



J.D. Cameron was an original Boozefighter who built quite a few formidable IDH cutdowns in his day. Craig now has a couple of them as does Dee Cameron, John's son and Craig's uncle. Dee also has John's Crocker-powered, British-gearboxed cutdown that the AMA outlawed from competition in the States. John would race it south of the border on weekends in Ensenada, Mexico.

Another original Boozefighter I came to know was Gil Armas. A couple of friends, myself and Gil hauled our bikes up to rural northeast Washington state for another antique motorcycle road run a few years back. Gil was hauling his single leg VLframed 90 inch Knucklehead with a Honda disc brake front fork. When I'd drive through a town I'd lose Gil's truck and run into him again when we passed out the other side. When we got where we were going I asked him what was up with that. He told me he hadn't renewed his license for over twenty years and didn't want to meet a cop. Old ways die hard. Gil was a small man and it was all he could do to start that bike of his.

Gil and C.B. Clausen are claimed to be the Boozefighters that were the first to successfully install a set of ULH flywheels into a Knuckle motor to produce an 80" stroker. C.B. was the BFMC's first president and went on to set many records on the SoCal dry lakes with his famous "Brute Jr." stroker Knuck before starting his successful Motorcycle Supply Company.

In 1958 ex-Boozefighter Jim Hunter rode C.B.'s "Brute" streamliner to a speed of 224.74 mph at Bonneville. The Boozefighters only existed from 1946 to 1954 but for those eight years they took it to the limit. Their racing, road runs and club get togethers were as lively as any of that era. Especially their 1947 4th of July weekend in Hollister. It made the legend.
